What are the entry requirements?

Grade 6 or above in English Language/Literature, Maths, Science (especially Biology), and History or Geography.

What will I study?

During the course, you will how different approaches explain human behaviour, how behaviour is studied and analysed and how to conduct your own research. You will also learn how to critically analyse both studies and theories.

How will my work be assessed?

The qualification is linear. Students will sit their exams at the end of their A level course.

Paper 1: Topics 1-4. Examination paper: A mixture of short and long answer questions and extended response questions. Total marks – 96. Duration: 2 hours. 33.3% of the total A level marks.

Paper 2: Topics 5-7. Examination paper: A mixture of short and long answer questions and extended response questions. Total marks – 96. Duration: 2 hours. 33.3% of the total A level marks.

Paper 3: Topic 8 plus some of the optional content. A mixture of short and long answer questions and extended response questions. Total marks – 96. Duration: 2 hours. 33.3% of the total A level marks.
